The benefits of messy play and learning

It has come to our attention that some children are limiting what learning experiences they engage in, because they are worried that they may get dirty, and therefore get into a bit of trouble at home. We want to reassure you that children's engagement in these types of experiences are really beneficial for their learning and development and is highly encouraged by our educators. Here is why:



- Messy play promotes and extends children's imagination and creativity
- Children enhance dispositions for learning which are skills for life (curiosity, cooperation, confidence, creativity, commitment, enthusiasm, persistence, imagination, reflexivity)
- Children enhance a range of skills and processes in the outdoors (sand, mud, water) such as problem solving, inquiry, experimentation, hypothesising, researching and investigating. Our outdoor environment is so important for this to happen. They learn to appreciate the natural environment and if children are limited to indoors, then it is difficult for these skills to be enhanced.
- Outdoor play allows interactions with others. When children play with other children they create
 social groups, test out ideas, challenge each others thinking and build new understandings.
 Outdoor play provides a supportive environment where children can ask questions, solve
 problems and engage in critical thinking.
