Sun Protection Policy

This policy is taken from the Cancer Council SA sample Sun Protection policy for Centres. This policy applies to all events on and off site.

Rationale:

A balance of ultraviolet (UV) radiation exposure is important for health. Too much of the sun's UV radiation can cause sunburn, skin and eye damage and skin cancer. Sun exposure during childhood and adolescence is a major factor in determining future skin cancer risk. Too little UV radiation from the sun can lead to low vitamin D levels. Vitamin D is essential for healthy bones and muscles, and for general health. Sensible sun protection when UV is 3 and above does not put people at risk of vitamin D deficiency.

Objectives:

This sun protection policy has been developed to:

- Encourage children and staff to use a combination of sun protection measures whenever UV Index levels reach 3 and above.
- Work towards a safe outdoor environment that provides shade for children and staff at appropriate times.
- Assist children to be responsible for their own sun protection.
- Ensure families and new staff are informed of the centre's sun protection policy.

Staff are encouraged to access the daily local sun protection times on the SunSmart app or http://www.myuv.com.au/ to assist with implementing this policy.

Policy review:

The Management Committee and staff regularly monitor and review the effectiveness of the sun protection policy (at least every three years) and revise the policy when required. Next review due October 2025.

To comply with the Department for Education requirements and SunSmart guidelines, the Centre uses a combination of sun protection measures for outdoor activities throughout the year, whenever the UV reaches 3 or above.

Procedures:

- To assist with the implementation of this policy, educators and children are encouraged to access, display and communicate the daily, local sun protection times.
- The sun protection measures listed below are used for all outdoor activities during the daily local sun protection times.
