Music Education

More and more research is identifying the benefits of music. Dr Anita Collins renown researcher shared key findings about the benefits of music on the brain.

They've discovered that we are born with our personality, hearing music lights up the entire brain, people who have a music brain are more connected and synchronised and that **SONG** is the first language.

The early years of a child is so crucial, having songs sung to children is **soothing and calming**, **also separates** the sounds in our English language. If children can't hear the language sound they can't speak the sound, then they will have difficulty reading.

Early music intervention enhances social skills and prepares children for reading. Some key activities for 3-5 year olds are keeping a beat, repeating a pattern using music equipment, singing (children struggle with singing in tune until they are 8 years old) and tone activities where they distinguish what equipment made the sound. This highlights the importance of having your child's *eyes and ears checked* at such an early age.

Another key piece of research is that to increase a child's ability to learn and manipulate knowledge (cognitive ability) they should *learn a musical* **instrument** by a trained person, minimum of 3-5 years. This will create great brain health, enabling all functions of the brain to connect and work with each other at high speeds.

The school is embracing the *Music Education Strategy* Our preschool's in the 2nd year of mentoring in teaching music, our junior primary involved in the Charanga music program; students listen and appraise musical activities, create and exploring through singing and performing. Year 4-7 students have the opportunity to be involved in the Festival of Music and access to music tuition.

Music is now in the playground! This week our school leaders opened our 'Orchestra Pit' unveiling a babel drum, xylophone and hand pipes. Experimenting with beats and patterns creates beautiful melody's. More music equipment will be installed in the coming weeks in the preschool and under the lone pine tree.


Sadie: Her was soft.


The Dentist will be visiting on the 3rd and 4th of June.

Parent Update

Week 3, Term 2 - 2021

Our regional schools

We understand that regional communities have some unique needs and challenges. In preparation for the year 7 to high school move in 2022, we conducted widespread consultation with our rural schools and communities so they could share their hopes and individual concerns.

We heard from more than 250 individuals and received 25 written contributions, 4 of which came from peak representative groups. Many regional families and communities were excited about the opportunities of bringing year 7 into high school.

Having listened to the feedback, we are working with country schools to ensure they have the right support for the move, especially in terms of staffing, professional learning and transport requirements. This Parent Update will address some commonquestions raised by country families during our consultation.

How will my child cope in a large high school?

For many regional students, starting high school means leaving a small primary school for something much bigger. We know from our pilot program that year 7s are well and truly ready for high school. The pilot is tracking the progress of students, families and staff from three schools that have already welcomed year 7s. One of them, John Pirie Secondary School, is regional. Feedback from pilot program students has indicated the vast majority are enjoying making new friends, trying new sports and activities, and learning in a larger, more mature environment.

Will my child cope with a longer bus ride, alongside older teenagers?

We acknowledge that the availability of services in regional locations is a broader community challenge. Some year 7 students will have longer commutes to high school, as do their peers in years 8 to 12.

Feedback from students in our pilot program has shown they quickly feel comfortable in the company of older students. Our pilot schools established peer leadership and mentoring programs to help year 7s feel welcomed by older year levels. The older students played an important role in orientating them to the high school settings.

Orientation and transition activities are being organised by individual schools to suit their communities' needs, but peer mentorship will be a common feature of them. Contact your local high school for more information on orientation programs and activities they have planned.

What if my local high school is more than 20km away?

By default, all year 7s will go to high school or area school from 2022. However, if your primary school is more than 20km away from your local area or high school by road, you are eligible to seek a 'by exception' exemption from your primary school principal to keep your current year 6 student in their primary school for year 7. These arrangements, which also apply to School of the Air, will apply for a transitional period until 2024, provided you attend one of 45 eligible primary schools. What if my local primary school loses student enrolments?

The state government has made a commitment that it will not close schools as part of the year 7 to high school move. For the eligible primary schools mentioned above, we are also offering top-up funding to ensure they don't lose classes due to the departure of year 7s. The funding will be available up to and including 2024.
