Programs operating at the preschool

Pre-Entry

One session per week for three weeks offered to families in term 4 of each year if numbers/ staff ratios permit.

Sessional Kindergarten for eligible children

Up to 15 hours of preschool is provided to children in their eligible year prior to starting school. Sessions are held all day on Mondays, Tuesdays and every second Wednesday (odd weeks). Cost is approximately \$5 per session.

σ Occasional Care

Funded Occasional Care sessions are held every Thursday with a morning session facilitated 9.00am-12pm. Cost is \$5 per session and concession is also available.

Through a rich PLAY environment the children, staff, families & community at Mt Pleasant & District Kindergarten strive to create a safe, supportive, fun, inclusive, respectful, challenging setting to foster learning as well as social and emotional development. We believe that investigating through a nature-focussed lens provides an opportunity to discover and learn about the wonders, beauty and complexities of our world.

We acknowledge that the land we play on is the traditional lands of the Peramangk people and we are committed to taking care of and learning more about the land together.

To be a life-long learner our preschool values learning dispositions. These include developing confidence, curiosity, communication, purposefulness, resourcefulness, persistence and co-operation. Our preschool works in harmony with children, families and the community to promote and develop these ways of thinking and being.

Our philosophy is seen as a living document, continually evolving in the light of new research, the ideas of new team members and input from families.

5. Centre Facilities

Buildings and grounds

Mt Pleasant & District Kindergarten was built in 1979.

We are located in walking distance to the Mt Pleasant Primary School and the main street. The outside environment consists of large grounds including, large trees, large grassed area, a covered sand pit area, mud kitchen, digging patch, vegetable patch, fairy garden, 2 x swing areas, a chicken coop, rabbit hutch, large bark chipped area with a cubby and a veranda area that has blinds and can be partly enclosed and is surrounded by an enclosed safety fence.

The inside environment has an office, kitchen, three main rooms, a designated rest area, toilets and nappy changing facilities.

Wheelchair access is available but the outside environment has some limited ability in places. There is no disabled toilet.



6. Local Community (intended for country preschools)

General characteristics:

Our community is quite diverse as we are situated at the edge of the Barossa and are surrounded by farming land (mainly sheep and cattle), forest and orchards/grapevines.

Parent and community involvement in the preschool

Parents participate in daily cleaning rosters, washing and feeding of animals.

Parents also participate in Governing Council, fundraising, excursions and 'stay and play sessions'.

The Mt Pleasant Natural Resource Centre stocks our recycled wrapping paper and packaged seeds for sale. They also travel to us and hold workshops every second term.

The Mt Pleasant Primary School also participates in a transitioning program which involves visits on a regular basis every fortnight including us visiting them at the school as well as them visiting us at the Kindergarten.

• Schools to which children generally transfer from this preschool

We have three main schools that we tend to feed these are Mt Pleasant Primary School, Birdwood Primary School, Palmer and Springton Primary School.

Other local care and educational facilities,

OHSC is available at Mt Pleasant Primary School, which many of our families' access.

Childcare is also available at Birdwood and Gumeracha.

Commercial/industrial and shopping facilities

There are two bakeries, two hotels, a post office, chemist, butcher, fodder store, small general store and several second hand shops in Mt Pleasant. The main supermarket is located at Birdwood 10km from Mt Pleasant.

There are several local sporting clubs including football, netball, tennis, soccer and cricket. There is also a Doctors surgery and hospital located in Mt Pleasant.
