#### Enrolment/Attendance

#### Programs operating at the preschool

15 hours of preschool is available for children in the year before they start school. These hours are split across three days. Children attend weekly for 2 full days and every second Wednesday they have an additional 4 hours.

# 2. Key Centre Policies

Centre Priorities/Statement of Purpose

Our philosophy is strongly influenced by the belief that play is the foundation of a child's learning journey. We are committed to providing a nurturing and vibrant environment where children can explore, create, and discover in an atmosphere that encourages curiosity and self-expression. Through intentional play-based experiences, we aim to inspire a love for learning that will serve as a foundation for a lifetime of intellectual and emotional growth.

Our dedicated team of teachers and educators understand the significance of their role as facilitators in the learning process. By carefully planning and creating a supportive environment, we empower children to make choices, solve problems and develop essential social and cognitive skills. We believe in fostering a sense



of autonomy, self-confidence and decision-making in each child, promoting both individual and group learning experiences.

Preschool Quality Improvement Plan (PQIP)

We develop an annual improvement plan to ensure that our centre meets national standards and that our staff are constantly learning and reflecting on the program, facilities, procedures and most importantly children's learning outcomes. There are opportunities for parent input, especially through Governing Council, and as we review and update policies and practices.

### 3. Curriculum

Our philosophy underpins our work. The required curriculum documents support us to create a learning environment and program which facilitate the best possible outcomes for each child.

## 4. Centre Based Staff

Full time Director, 1.6 Teachers, and 0.6 Early Childhood Workers. Additional staff negotiated according to children's needs.

Performance Management

Staff are well supported in a collaborative environment. Regular Performance Development Plan (PDP) meetings are held to encourage ongoing learning and ensure staff can support our philosophy, values and practices. We are committed to working as a team to achieve the best outcomes for children.



### 5. Centre Facilities

Buildings and grounds

The centre has a large indoor space, set out in areas that support different play and learning opportunities. We constantly redesign the space and each area, as the environment is an 'additional teacher', being the source of inspiration and creativity.

The large, attached veranda provides opportunities for children to play in the shade or away from inclement weather, and is often set up for art experiences.

Although aged, the buildings provide scope for wide-ranging learning options and use natural materials as much as possible.

The outdoor space is extensive and provides a range of fixed and flexible spaces for play, learning and fun.

Capacity (per session)

The centre has a total capacity of 50 children. We operate in two sessions, with groups of 20 and 30 children, staffed according to the needs of each group.

Access for children and staff with disabilities

Most areas are accessible to children and staff with disabilities. Further accommodations can be negotiated with the department if required.

# 6. Local Community

Parent and community involvement in the preschool

We enthusiastically involve parents care providers in our centre's operations.

Parents and care providers are encouraged to settle their child in the learning environment before leaving at the beginning of each session. Please speak to us if you need additional support with this.

Families are actively encouraged to participate in their children's learning, especially during special interest weeks and events. We also encourage parents to join the governing council. Meetings are held twice a term and this is a wonderful opportunity to learn more about how we operate and to have a say.



Parents and Care providers wishing to volunteer their time can do so once they have all relevant documents and induction in place. Please see the Director on how to obtain these.

East Torrens Primary School, East Marden Primary School, Thordan Park Primary School and local Catholic schools.
