Assessment Procedures and Reporting

Staff continuously observe and record aspects of children's play. Samples of children's work are kept in their individual profile; available to parents at all times. Each child is a focus Child (usually in their 2nd^t and 4th terms of kindergarten). Specific anecdotes of children's play are recorded at this time as well as some more formalised recording of children's

development in the areas of fine and gross motor, cognitive and well being. Data is collected on entry skills and again prior to transitioning to school to inform teaching practice and curriculum development.

An Individual Learning Plan is then developed and discussed with parents. Summative Statements are prepared in line with Developmental Learning Outcomes and shared with parents and then the child's school.

 - : Director (F.T.), Teacher (F.T.), Early Childhood Worker (F.T.E.), Early Childhood Worker (Half Time)
 - Leadership Structure
 - : Director is manager for the centre.
 - Performance Management Program
 - : Performance Development Review is carried out yearly for each staff member.
- Access to special support staff
 - : A range of support services is available at the kindergarten for children with particular needs. These include Preschool Support Program which provides an additional staff member to provide extra support to individual children with specific needs
 - : Bilingual Support Program which provides staff and child support for language and culture of a child from a Non-English speaking background
 - : Special services which provide a range of support services including Speech Pathologist, Special Educator, Social Worker, Psychologist, Aboriginal Community Worker. The needs of these children are considered when planning the kindergarten program.

5. Centre Facilities

Buildings and grounds

: Building is 60 years old, well maintained with new floor coverings. The grounds are very shady with a large covered sandpit, swings, digging patch and movable equipment. The adjoining St Helen's Park adds a feeling of spaciousness and provides space for special events. The centre is located at the end of a nothrough road with a small car park available.

: 45 kindergarten children each day
